

Propose Nebraska

Bandmasters Group

Recently there has been much discussion of Nebraska's need for a professional bandmaster's organization, paralleling those found in other states. As a result, an organizational meeting exploring the advantages of such a group is scheduled for Jan. 7, 1962, at 3:00 o'clock at Pershing Auditorium in Lincoln, Nebr.

It is hoped that appropriate activities for such a group will be the heart of the discussion in addition to such organizational matters as are needed to draw up a constitution, nominate a slate of candidates, and plan an early convention. Present thinking is based on the need for providing professional growth experiences for our many young directors and an all around exchange of ideas specifically related to the practicing band director's problems. It is further hoped that a greater comraderie will generate an enthusiasm among our band directors for continued efforts as Nebraska instrumental teachers.

The excellent work of present Nebraska professional and activity groups is recognized and it is anticipated that the full support of the bandmasters will continue for those associations who now operate our clinic and contest activities.

The success of the organizational venture is based on the support received at this meeting. This is your invitation to attend and express your views. If you are unable to make the trip you are encouraged to write your views in a letter with particular emphasis upon the agenda which you feel most appropriate for the annual meeting of this group. You may address your replies to: Nebraska Bandmasters Organizing Committee, c-o Pershing Auditorium, Lincoln, Nebr.

Meet to Form State Organization

Another progressive step in Nebraska Music was undertaken on Jan. 7, 1962, when a group of interested band directors met at Pershing Auditorium in Lincoln to discuss the formation of an organization to benefit directors of bands in our State. The enthusiasm of this group was such that it resulted in the appointment of committees, the scheduling of a planning meeting for these committees on March 25, and arrangements for the first convention to be held in Lincoln on June 1 and 2 of this year.

Memberships are now being received by Byron Havlicek who was appointed treasurer, pro tem. It is hoped that those persons who might like to join this organization will send dues in the amount of five dollars to him, c-o the Columbus City Schools, Columbus, Nebr. The response of Nebraska band directors to this idea can only be measured by those who actively support the formation of the group by payment of their dues. The convention program can be made more worthwhile if we know as soon as possible how many members to plan for.

To carry forward the organization of this group and arrange for the first convention the following committees have begun work: David Fowler, Jack Snider, William Wurtz, Organizing committee; James King, Paul Austin, Lou Burkel, Constitution committee; Byron Havlicek, Phil Murphy, Orlan Thomas, Arthur Schrepel, Convention program committee.

A statement of purposes is in the making, as well as a progress report for the membership. It is generally agreed that the organization will have as its primary purpose a continuing effort to provide "in service" professional training sessions. This effort to continually improve school band work is in the interest of the young musicians who annually enroll in these groups. Convention programs are to center around the membership itself (very few events requiring high school students) and meet out of school time. It is felt that such additional activities of this group will in no way deter the loyalty of its members to the presently established professional organization such as NSEA, NMEA, and the Nebraska State Activities Association.

The directors present at the organizational meeting further suggested that the exchange of experiences among the membership was well worth the organizational effort.

NSBA CONVENTION

Final arrangements for the first convention of the newly formed Nebras-ka State Bandmasters Association have been made. A fine representation of our State's directors have pledged their support by joining the group as charter members. As is true with any such effort the strength and effectiveness of a band director's professional group will depend on the devotion of its membership.

The program (see advertisement elsewhere in the Educator) will center around a director's band under the leadership of Frank Piersol, Director of Bands at Iowa State University. Clinic sessions will be conducted by Dean Killion, Director of Band at Texas Tech and Milo Hovey, Educational Director of the Selmer Band Instrument Company.

The convention will open on Friday evening, June 1, with a banquet in the Pan-American Room of the Nebraska Union. It will be followed by a concert by the University of Nebraska Symphonic Band under the direction of Jack Snider. The business session will conclude the first evening. Rehearsals of the director's band and clinic sessions will fill the schedule for Saturday, June 2, with a concert in the evening by the director's group.

In order to make proper reservations for the banquet and arrange the roster of players for the director's band it will be necessary to have memberships as soon as possible. Please send dues and a notation of your desire to attend the banquet to Bryon Havlicek, Instructor of Instrumental Music, Columbus Public Schools, Columbus, Nebraska.

George Anderson Organizes Bandmasters

The idea for organizing a Bandmaster organization is certainly not unique with the first organizing committee. In fact this group was active only because the demand for such an organization was expressed by so many band directors in Nebraska.

The most definitive exploration of the idea to form an organization was made by Mr. George W. Anderson during the school year 1960-61. Those who were acquainted with Mr. Anderson know the effect his dynamic leadership had on the state's musical activities. Even though he was very busy teaching a most successful junior high instrumental program, was President of the Lincoln Teachers Association, Chairman of the Nebraska Marching Contest (Pershing), and Secretary of the Nebraska Music Educators Association, he initiated invitations to start the Nebraska State Bandmasters Association (NSBA). In his invitation to directors to join such a group was a proviso that they include \$10 in order that work might begin.

The rather surprising response to this informal invitation is the basis for the organizational effort. Had George Anderson stayed in our state it is certain that he would be devoting his tireless efforts to this project. His decision to accept a position on the supervisory staff of the Port Huron, Michigan Schools left a void most difficult to fill. It is a tribute to his energies and abilities that in each area he was replaced by a committee, since individulas did not feel that they could shoulder any one of the new projects single-handedly.

Resume of First Organizational Meeting

The invitation for the first organizational meeting was carried in the December issue of the Nebraska Music Educator. It was held in Lincolnk at the Pershing Municipal Auditorium on January 6, 1962 at three o'clock.

Three committees came as a result of this organizational meeting: Organizing, Constitution, Convention Program. Mr. Byron Havlicek was appointed Treasurer Pro Tem and was authorized to receive dues in the amount of \$5.00. A convention was planned for June 1-2, 1962 at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln Student Union.

Since several persons in the organizing committee for the first convention were also members of the Nebraska Marching Band Festival Committee (Pershing Auditorium), the Festival committee under the leadership of Phil Murphy allocated \$300 to NSBA for the first year's program. The Marching Festival donated over \$11,000 to the Nebraska Bandmasters until 1985 when NSBA became financially able to support themselves.



Outstanding Bandmaster Award

After several years of planning and study, the Outstanding Bandmaster Award became a reality in 1975. Eugene Stoll, former Supervisor of Instrumental Music in the Lincoln Public Schools (now deceased), presented the original idea for the award. NSBA Public Relations Chairman, Michael Veak, drew up the guidelines with his committee Duane W. Johnson and Eugene Stoll.

The Nebraska Marching Band Festival (Pershing) funded the award while NSBA selected the recipient of the award. Originally candidates were screened by a committee of six persons, one from each NSEA district in the state. A final selection committee of three persons chose the person to receive the Outstanding Bandmaster Award.

One paragraph in the committee's guidelines reads, "As a profession we must constantly seek out and welcome opportunities to recognize excellence among band directors throughout the state and make the public aware of the vital role the band director plays in molding today's youth for a better tomorrow."

The Outstanding Bandmaster Award is named in honor of a man known and respected by many Nebraskans. Having retired as Director of Bands at UNL in 1974 after 37 years at the University, he is the Father of UNL's Band Day involving high school musicians and the festivity is now featured at hundreds of colleges and universities nationwide. Over the years he also has become a respected advisor to high school band programs across the nation. His vigorous encouragement has motivated

countless directors and students to achieve greater heights of excellence in their respective band programs. The NSBA proudly named the award the DONALD A LENTZ OUTSTANDING BANDMASTER AWARD.

The first recipient of the DONALD A. LENTZ OUTSTANDING BANDMASTER AWARD was B.A. Johnson, Syracuse. "Bud" Johnson was extremely active in fostering the betterment of bands in Nebraska by being dedicated toward achieving a high degree of excellence. His years of outstanding service was a prime consideration of the selection committee. His strong commitment to a career as a band director is shown through his sons, who both chose the same career as their father.





The Wingra Woodwind Quintet is one of the busiest musical organizations connected with the University of Wisconsin-Madison. Since its formation in 1965 the group has performed in ninety percent of Wisconsin's counties. Their recent Carnegie Hall debut was commended by New York Times music critic Peter Davis who noted, "The performances were so smoothly integrated and technically polished that one was scarcely aware of the skilled discipline that motivated them." The quintet also appears on the Golden Crest and Spectrum record labels.

Karen Gifford has studied at the University of Southern California (B.M. Summa cum Laude, 1983) and Northwestern University (M.M., 1984). She has played principal flute with the USC Symphony, USC Opera Orchestra, Music Academy of the West Festival Orchestra and Opera Orchestra, Northwestern University Symphony Orchestra, and Young Musicians Foundation Debut Orchestra. As a member of the 1982 USC Woodwind Quintet, Karen won the Saunderson Award at

the Coleman Chamber Music Competition and was chosen to perform for the New World Festival of the Arts in Miami, Florida. While at the University of Southern California, Karen also received the Ensemble Award for Woodwind Chamber Music. Karen is currently a doctoral candidate at the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

While an undergraduate oboe major at Indiana University, Marc Fink earned the prestigious "Performer's Certificate" from the music faculty for his outstanding work. Before coming to Madison in 1973, Fink played with the Japan University, he has also performed with the California Music Center Chamber Players, the Pro Arte Quartet, the Indianapolis Chamber Music Society (Suzuki and Friends), and several summers at the Marcel Moyse woodwind seminars in Brattleboro, Vermont.

Glenn Bowen, clarinetist, past vicepresident of the International Clarinet Society, holds graduate degrees from the Eastman School of Music. He has performed with the New York Woodwind Quintet, Pro Arte Quartet, and Woodwind Arts Quintet, and has served as principal clarinetist with the Arkansas State Symphony, Ballet Theater Orchestra, and Eastman Wind Ensemble. Prior to joining the UW-Madison faculty, Bowen taught at North Dakota State University, Concordia Conservatory, Northwestern University, and Lawrence University. He is author of Making and Adjusting Clarinet Reeds and is active as a mouthpiece craftsman

Douglas Hill, Professor of Horn at the University of Wisconsin-Madison and past president of the International Horn Society, has played solo horn with the Rochester Philharmonic, New York City Ballet Orchestra, Contemporary Chamber Ensemble (European tour and recording), St. Louis and Madison Symphony Orchestras. He has worked with the Spoleto Festival, New York, American and Eastern Brass Quintets. He is also noted for his extensive publications, including a beginning book, a book on extended techniques for horn, numerous compositions and solo and chamber music recordings. Hill has appeared as a soloist and clinician in the United States, West Germany, the People's Republic of China and France, including five International Horn Workshops. One of Hill's horn teachers was Jack Snider, University of Nebraska-

Richard Lottridge, bassoonist, played seven years with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra. He earned an Artist's Diploma from the Curtis Institute of Music, a Bachelor of Music from Yale, a Master of Music from the American Conservatory in Chicago, and two Fellowships to the Berkshire Music Festival at Tanglewood. Lottridge can be heard in a solo recital on Golden Crest Records.

With such a broad range of experience to draw upon, the group is able to maintain a repertoire of over eighty-five compositions including pieces from the Renaissance to the present. One of the Quintet's most recent achievements is a recording of two major works for quintet and bass clarinet. Spectrum Records SR-142, The Wingra Quintet Plus One, also features UW-Madison Professor Les Thimmig's composition, "Stanzas, Book VIII''. Mr. Thimmig plays bass clarinet for his work and Janacek's "Mladi" and both pieces were part of the Quintet's New York debut recital. There is a growing list of outstanding music composed for the Wingra Quintet: in the case of this Spectrum recording, it is music for Wingra and friend.

The Wingra Quintet will be performing a concert at eight o'clock Friday evening at the NSBA 25th convention. The concert will be in the Chapel Theater. During the convention each of the quintet members will be presenting clinics.

Intercollegiate Band Since 1980

The first Nebraska Intercollegiate Band (NIB) was organized as part of the activities of the 1980 Nebraska State Bandmasters Association convention. It was considered to be such a successful endeavor by participants, organizers and spectators alike that it has since been a regular part of each succeeding NSBA convention.

The size of the band over the years has ranged from 48 to 81 members and has represented musicians from as many as eight different colleges/ universities for any given year. The membership of the NIB is taken from recommendations by the band directors from each participating state college or university (not all schools have participated every year because of various reasons). Most of the students recommended are music education majors and all are required to be student members of NSBA. The final selection of student musicians recommended to membership in the NIB is at the discretion of the coordinator of the NIB (the NSBA College/University Representative.

David Edris, Peru State College). The coordinator's decisions are based upon factors of instrumental balance and need. Other factors given consideration are student interest and director's comments. Seating and chair placement is determined by auditions on the first day before rehearsals begin.

The guest conductors have traditionally been selected by the NIB coordinator and have been among some of the most renowned band conductors associated with music in higher education. The guest conductor for this year's NIB is Jack R. Snider, the first President of NSBA. Jack Snider is Professor of Music at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, former Director of Bands at UN-L, former Chairman of the Nebraska Marching Band Festival, and Conductor of the Lincoln Community Concert Band.

The 1986 Nebraska Intercollegiate Band will perform a world premier of a new work for band commissioned from composer Tim Marr especially for the 25th Anniversary Convention of NSBA.

Young Band Director Award

The NSBA Past Presidents Council is instituting a new award to celebrate the anniversary convention. . . that of the NSBA Young Band Directors Award.

Band directors that have taught from three to seven years are eligible for the award. The Past Presidents Council believes that it is important to encourage young persons to stay in the field of instrumental music education. One way to encourage their retention is to recognize them for their teaching endeavors and dedication to the profession.

There have been over twenty nominees for the award from all geographic areas of the state. Nominations have been made by students, band directors, school administrators, and college professors. A committee of four Past Presidents chaired by Duane W. Johnson will make the final selection of persons to receive the award. The committee will consider: musical achievements, community and activity participation, teaching philosophy, and personal goals in the music teaching profession. The winners will be announced at the Friday evening banquet during the silver anniversary conven-

With approximately 72 members, the Concert Band is at the foundation of a diverse and continually expanding band program at the College. 




UNL Symphony Band





Remember Band Day at UN-L?

There is some controversy as to when Band Day at UN-L actually began. Band Day was in full swing, however, when Donald A. Lentz took over in 1937 as Director of Bands at UN-L.

Band Day at UN-L was discontinued by the UN-L athletic department in 1972 due to important changes in logistic and physical operations within the stadium. A few years prior to 1972, bands were not allowed on the field for halftime, but played music in the stands.

Under the Presidency of Phil Murphy, the Nebraska State Bandmasters Association and its Board of Directors made a proposal to university officials regarding a marching band workshop. The following proposal was presented:

In accordance with a directive from University and Athletic department officials, the Executive Board of the Nebraska State Bandmasters Association have met several times to consider

an alternative event to the University of Nebraska Band Day which was discontinued at Lincoln in the Fall of 1972. It is generally assumed that all who have been involved in this event agree that Band Day, through the many years of its existence, has greatly helped to build a close relationship between the University of Nebraska and high schools throughout the state. With this thought in mind, the NSBA makes the following proposal to the University of Nebraska Athletic Department: "That the University of Nebraska Cornhusker Marching Band be annually assigned to a site specified annually by the NSBA Executive Board, and there, serving as host, provide clinical services, training techniques and demonstration-performances for approximately 1,000 high school band students throughout the state. The cost of this proposal would be approximately \$8,000. This would annually

provide funds for University Band transportation by bus, meals of all participants, administrative costs, a nationally recognized marching band clinician, and a \$1,000 appropriation to be used specifically for the annual NSBA convention program."

Suggestions for implementation of the above proposal:

- Clinic-organized bands of approximately 100 members each will be trained and critiqued.
- Clinic bands will drill simultaneously on stadium and practice fields in and around the selected site.
- Clinic bands will provide an evening exhibition followed by a Cornhusker Band performance.

Needless to say, the proposal was not accepted by the University of Nebraska Athletic Department.


Scholarships


In 1970, the Nebraska Marching Band Festival began giving an annual allocation of moneys to the NSBA for use in presenting scholarships to high school seniors who planned to major in music at a Nebraska college or university. For ten years thousands of dollars were presented to at least two graduating high school seniors each year. The money was given to the students after they completed twelve hours in the field of a music major.

After ten years of awarding scholarships to young persons majoring in music, and finding out that very few of those students ever went on to become future music educators in the state of Nebraska, NSBA decided that a change in the scholarship was necessary.

The year 1981 brought the addition of school band directors to receive a scholarship for continuation of graduate study. In 1982 it was decided that college/university music majors could also apply.

The scholarship program in NSBA is now offering scholarships to high school seniors, college music majors, and school band directors. NSBA is now funding the scholarship program.


