Program

There are no regulations attached to the selection of music for the NSBA Concert Band Festival. To provide a broader context for the audience, compositions marked with a star (*) appear on the University Interscholastic League 2007-2010 Prescribed Music List. The UIL is the largest interschool organization of its kind in the world, and its music list is one of the most frequently cited in discussions of school band literature. Compositions marked with a cap (^) appear on the National Band Association Selective Music List. The NBA is the largest band directors' professional organization in the world, and it is dedicated to the attainment of a high level of excellence for bands and band music. Grade levels correspond to an industry standard scale from 1 (simplest) to 6 (most complex). Grade information for this program was cross referenced when possible among the two lists mentioned above. For those works not appearing on UIL or NBA, grade information was gleaned from the Shattinger Music database.



Festival Clinicians



Prof. Robert Meunier is Director of Bands and Professor of Music at Drake University where he is the conductor of the wind symphony, and director of percussion studies. Meunier is in demand as a guest conductor, clinician and adjudicator, and is a contributing author to five volumes of Teaching Music Through Performance in Band, Teaching Music Through Performing Marches and Teaching Music Through Jazz Performance. He has appeared in concert throughout the United States, and in Sweden, Canada and Mexico, where he has been an artist/conductor in residence at the Conservatorio Nacional de Musica and at the Academia de Musica Escuela de Musica Ollin

Yoliztli in Mexico City.

Meunier holds a Bachelor of Science in music education from the University of Mary, a Master of Music in percussion performance from the University of Wisconsin-Madison and has pursued doctoral studies in wind conducting at the University of North Texas. He is the immediate past- president of the Iowa Bandmasters Association, and a past-president of the South Central Iowa Bandmasters Association and the Iowa Chapter of the Percussive Arts Society. He is a member of the College Band Directors National Association, Iowa Bandmasters Association, Pi Kappa Lambda Honor Society, the Percussive Arts Society, and an honorary member of Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia. In 2005, Meunier was honored as Drake's College of Arts and Sciences Outstanding Teacher of the Year.



Dr. Christopher Morehouse is Director of Bands and Assistant Professor of Music at Southern Illinois University Carbondale, where he serves as conductor of the SIUC Wind Ensemble, teaches undergraduate and graduate conducting, wind literature, and instrumental methods, and administers the entire university bands program. He maintains an active schedule as guest conductor, clinician, and adjudicator and is currently a member of the College Band Directors National Association, the World Association for Symphonic Bands and Ensembles, MENC: The National Association for Music Education, and the Illinois Music Educators Association.

Prior to joining the faculty at Southern Illinois University Carbondale, Dr. Morehouse taught at the elementary, middle, and high school levels in New York and Massachusetts for seven years. He has served as the conductor of the University of Dayton (Ohio) Symphonic Wind Ensemble, conductor and music director of the Cincinnati Youth Wind Ensemble, assistant conductor for the Concord (Massachusetts) Band, guest conductor of the Metropolitan Wind Symphony, and

commissioned works project chairperson on the executive board of the Massachusetts Instrumental and Choral Conductors Association. Dr. Morehouse has published articles in two volumes of the Teaching Music through Performance in Band series, and has contributed clinic reviews for the World Association for Symphonic Bands and Ensembles International Conferences held in Killarney, Ireland and Cincinnati, Ohio.

Dr. Morehouse received his Bachelor of Music degree in music education from Ithaca College, Master of Music degree in wind ensemble conducting from the New England Conservatory of Music, and Doctor of Musical Arts degree in conducting, wind emphasis, from the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music.



Dr. Christopher Werner is from Medford, Wisconsin and is now in his fifth year as instrumental music teacher at La Crosse Central High School. He is Conductor of the Wind Ensemble, Pep Band, Grand Central Station Show Band, instructor of Music Theory, and teamteaches the Red Raider Marching Band along with instrumental lessons. In addition to the responsibilities at CHS, Dr. Werner is a guest conductor for the La Crosse Concert Band, adjudicates for the Wisconsin School Music Association, is President-Elect for the National Band Association-Wisconsin Chapter, and serves on the Orchestra Staff for the Wisconsin State Music Association Honors Project. He has

twice been awarded the "Citation of Excellence" from the National Band Association.

Werner holds the DMA in Wind Conducting degree from the University of Nebraska-Lincoln. He has the distinction of being the first University of Nebraska DMA recipient of the Wind Conducting degree and also the first Hixson-Lied College of Fine and Performing Arts F. Pace Woods Scholar in Music. He also holds a Bachelor's degree in Music Education from the University of Wisconsin - La Crosse and Master of Music degree in Wind Conducting from the University of Wisconsin – Milwaukee.

Dr. Werner is published in the band director reference book, "Teaching Music Through Performance in Beginning Band," published by GIA Publications, Chicago, IL and was involved in the production of the corresponding recordings as a clarinetist and editor. He also served as editor and contributor to the Nebraska State Bandmasters Association of their 2005 revision of "Selective Music for Bands." He has membership with the College Band Directors National Association, National Band Association, and MENC: The National Association for Music Education.
